<u>Life on a Performance Catamaran: The Good, The Bad, & The Beautiful</u>

My partner, Melissa, and I commenced our cruising adventure six years ago by seeking out the perfect monohull. Monohulls were what we knew - since 15 of our last 17 sailboats were just that.

After completing a couple passages with friends aboard cruising catamarans, I was told by the admiral that she would join in this adventure if it was via a catamaran. We appreciated that the cats did not heel and that the salon and cockpit living

space were on one level and afforded more visibility of our surroundings.

For the first time, we wanted to purchase a new boat. This change to a cat was late in the game and just in time for the 2017 Annapolis show. We quickly altered course and hit the show to try to choose the right boat for us.

I knew from my prior 50+ years of sailing performance boats, albeit limited cruising cat experience, that I would be most happy sailing a performance cat, preferably a catamaran with dagger boards to enable good upwind vmg. Yet we also wanted the space, nice amenities and comfort a catamaran provides. We prioritized boats that were meant for safe tough offshore sailing, had good build quality and level of fit/finish, and enclosed, protected helms. We narrowed it down to the Balance 526 and the new all carbon construction HH50, also 52' LOA.

We have now lived full time aboard Tribute, hull 1 of the HH 50 for nearly two years. Over 12,000 NM have passed under her hulls. Living aboard and sailing this performance cruising cat has been a marvelous experience. Tribute is quick on all points of sail. She has very responsive handling with an extremely light feel to the helm due to direct rod steering, even though she is still a large cruising catamaran. She tacks almost as quickly as my Farr 395 did.

Tribute points well and is rewarding to sail to windward at 28-30 degrees apparent due to the 11' 'C' shaped dagger boards that provide lots of lift. Her movement through a seaway is quite good, displaying very little of the typical hobby horse cat movement. We assume this performance is due to the combined factors of decreased weight, deep boards, stiffer narrower hull design/construction and speed.

Tribute has all the amenities of most other cruising cats in her size range: multiple fridges/freezers, washer/dryer, multiple A/C units scattered throughout, solar and lithium ion battery bank, generator, nice gas grill, built in microwave, watermaker, and more than enough storage space.

The flow and the layout is intuitive and comfortable, with an open and contemporary feel. Tribute has great ventilation throughout. We love the ease and comfort with which we live aboard both at sea and anchor.

An advantage of a lighter, stiffer boat with slightly narrower hulls means faster performance, but the down side is less space in the hulls and lower buoyancy, although other spaces are nearly equivalent. Weight savings also means no fly bridge seating or forward bridge deck cockpit space. This decreased buoyancy also translates to quicker sinking upon loading. We have to be extremely careful not to overload the boat, or much of that performance ability rapidly disappears. We have to often make difficult choices on what to bring along to avoid boat obesity. I'm sure other catamarans have more leeway here.

As we all know, with every boat choice there involves compromise. New means Not Everything Works. It has taken much of the first two years of ownership to get all the kinks out of the boat. Nothing serious has occurred, but little annoying aspects have finally been resolved.

Another negative of light weight and no keel surface to dig in is difficult docking and maneuvering at low speeds, as she blows like a leaf sideways with either breeze or current. I should've opted for the bow thruster. Performance cats sail well, but we've noticed most other cats have larger engines that motor better and faster.

While the carbon fiber boards give us awesome upwind performance, they can be anxiety provoking when negotiating thin water. Fully lifted, they still draw 5'8" and we need to be extremely careful not to hit bottom when moving- anything more than a soft grounding would slam the boards back into the aft bearings and require repair. Worse yet in a hard grounding with speed, there's a chance the lower portion of the board could snap off. Due to their carbon grid and foam construction, this situation would likely require replacement. We would have to hope for a lottery ticket win in that case.

Another consideration of drawbacks is the increased overall financial burden. The increased performance and lighter stiffer all carbon construction require added strength to handle these loads, and this adds to the cost. This type of boat screams for laminate or high tech sails which we have already found aren't as durable or optimal for cruising purposes.

The initial upfront cost is generally greater as are ongoing costs such as insurance (which has been a challenge on all carbon boats) as well as repair and replacement costs - likely slightly greater due to specialized parts and service needs.

Lastly, we have found hauling out and blocking more of a hassle, as we require high density foam blocks to spread the load. We can't use jack stands to store on the

hard, as there are no keels to spread the load of the hulls upon.

All in all, we are very pleased with our choice and loving life aboard Tribute. But I'm sure most of our satisfaction is due to the amazing lifestyle we are lucky to live out here - and any boat would be fantastic if you are out here living this dream!



We are s/v Woza Moya. "Woza Moya" is a polysemy, from the Zulu words for "Come Wind" and also "Come Spirit" - usually denoting the Holy Spirit. In sailing lore, there are three kinds of wind: too little, too much and in the wrong direction. We experienced it all!

To start with, we left Hampton with strong winds and sailed close reach down to Cape Hatteras making record time, with speeds averaging over 7 knots in our Beneteau 393. Then into the Gulf Stream and well, no wind. Fortunately, the Salty Dawgs insisted that I take extra fuel and we used nearly all of it to get to Marsh Harbour.

So, when we wanted to try our arm at a longer cruise, we started looking for a support group, so to speak. What is cool about the Dawgs is that they expect you to be grown-up about sailing – while they offer up all the support you could possibly require, ultimately, they leave you to captain your own vessel. This paradigm carries forward into the rally itself, with plenty of social time, but also plenty of space to do your own thing.





We have sailed quite a bit of the Caribbean on charters, so wanted to try the Bahamas, and could not have been more pleased. First, our Port Captain, Allen Roberts, was very engaging, generous, and knowledgeable. Second, the islands certainly did not disappoint. Third, we met a great bunch of people, both Dawgs and cruisers in general.

But back to the wind. These fronts come on a regular basis and they can bring a lot of wind (twice we have been holed up for more than 5 days waiting on weather), if its not a lot of wind it can be in the wrong direction too (westerly) and even cold (well it

has gone down to the mid-sixties at night).

These two weeks or so of discomfort were more than compensated for by the 5 months of great sailing, fishing, snorkeling, meeting fellow cruisers and learning about the cruising life. Here are a few lessons:





- -Definitely do some fishing. I have never really done it before and we have eaten quite a few of my catches.
- -I carry a 6'3" draft and I did not really find it was too limiting. Sure I could not go where some cats went, but I got close enough.
- -Utilize the Dawgs they are a great resource and radio them when you see a flag (Oh yes, fly the flag).

Well from Woza Moya, we are hoping that the moya does not woza quite as much as it has over the last couple of days, but we are looking forward to cruising with the Dawgs again.




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
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HOMEWARD BOUND RALLY

DOWNEAST RALLY
